Dear Trinity Community,

As I was praying over the bread and wine recently, one phrase jumped out at me. "We offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving".

I've heard and prayed this countless times in my life and it's jumped out at me before, but this time was different. It made me think about tithing and offering to God the first fruits of our labor and all we have and all that we are.

Have you ever thought about the offering of praise and thanksgiving as a sacrifice to God?

When I think of sacrifice, I think of giving up something. Usually, it's something that is costly and potentially painful.

According to The Merriam-Webster Dictionary, Sacrifice is 1) the offering of something precious to a deity; 2) something offered in sacrifice; 3) loss, deprivation. Also, Offer is 1) sacrifice; 2) to present for acceptance. To Tithe is to give to God the first-fruits, the first 10%, of what we receive back to God as a token of gratitude for God's incredible generosity.

The prayer during Holy Eucharist is that "we", all of us in the gathered community, are intentionally "offering" to God our "sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving." And we do this each time we join in Holy Eucharist. When we sing the Doxology – Praise God from whom all blessings flow – you'll notice that I lift the bread and the wine and the offering plates. These items signify the offering of the first fruits of our life and labor back to God.

While we do this in community, I wonder about how each of us do this on our own and with our families.

When I deposit my paycheck, the first check I write is my tithe to Trinity as an expression of my gratitude to God. Before I began tithing I struggled to make ends meet. I was in an hourly wage job and I had, maybe, \$100 in the bank for the following weeks after writing that first check. But I was convicted of my need to make that commitment to God.

My life and financial concerns became greatly diminished once I began tithing even though my hourly wage job remained the same. There were still times when I was in need, but somehow, those needs were met. By continuing to honor God in this way, I still experience a kind of freedom that I didn't have before making that commitment.

This makes me wonder, what if I started each day with an expression of praise to God for my life and all creation? And what if I ended each day with thanking God for the experiences of God I had throughout the day? Might I experience a new kind of freedom?

I invite you to join me in an experiment over the summer to offer your sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving as the first fruits of your life and to consider if your financial life reflects that same gratitude. God's generosity is abundant and we are called to offer back to God a token of that abundance with praise and thanksgiving. What does that look like for you?

The Parable of the Lost Sheep

The Parable of the Lost Sheep is one of the parables of Jesus and is found in the Gospel of Matthew (18:12-14) and the Gospel of Luke (15:3-7). A parable is usually a brief story that illustrates a moral or religious lesson. Jesus tells the parable to show that the Kingdom of God is accessible to all, even to those who were sinners or who strayed from God’s path.

In the story, Jesus uses the example of a shepherd who has 100 sheep and one goes missing. The shepherd leaves the 99 others and searches for the lost sheep. Jesus stresses that when the shepherd finds the lost sheep, he rejoices over it more than over the 99 sheep who did not go astray. The lost sheep represents a lost person. As in the story of the Good Shepherd, Jesus is the shepherd identifying Himself with the image of God. *The Parable of the Lost Sheep* is also a reference to the Old Testament where God says that He will search for the stray sheep, rescue them and look after them (Ezekiel 34:11-16).

At the end of the parable, the rejoicing of the shepherd represents God rejoicing with the angels over the one sheep who was lost and is now found. The image of God rejoicing at the recovery of lost sinners contrasts with the criticism of the religious leaders which prompted this parable.

At Trinity Church, the windows illustrating *the Parable of the Prodigal Son (Lost Son)* and *the Parable of the Lost Sheep* are a

couplet dealing with redemption. The parables are an allegory of God’s mercy and grace seeking out the lost.
