Dear Trinity Community,

It's hard to believe that Lent is upon us. On Tuesday, February 13, the Vestry will host our Annual Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper from 5-7pm at \$6 a ticket. Then on Wednesday, February 14, we will offer Ash Wednesday services with Holy Eucharist at noon (spoken) and 7pm (with music).

Throughout the Wednesdays in Lent (February 21-March27), we will, again, offer Stations-Soup-Study. At 6pm we will pray The Way of the Cross, also known as Stations of the Cross, in which we journey through the different parts of the last day of the life of Jesus. Then at 6:30pm we will share a simple soup meal (provided by attendees via a sign-up sheet) and at 7pm we will begin our Bible Study of the upcoming Sunday's readings.

For a light-hearted activity, you may want to participate in Lent Madness, the fun March madness-like experience that pits two saints against one another each day during Lent until the winner receives the revered Golden Halo. Go to http://<u>www.lentmadness.org</u> to vote, sign up for daily emails, and learn about this fun Lent activity. They also have a Facebook page.

Many of you know I've been spending as much time as I can with my parents as their needs change. One of the things I've noticed during our visits is their need to go slower and be more deliberate and focused on the things they do. This has caused me to slow down when I'm with them. After my return from the last trip, I notice that I've slowed down a bit in my own life. I'm not rushing so much and I'm paying more attention to what or who is in front of me without focusing on my To Do List or what's coming up next. I'm finding unexpected freedom in this.

Maybe this is a good thing to try during Lent 2024. To slow down. To pay attention to what's right in front of us. To give up rushing and focus on what is going on in the moment.

Here are some questions to help you discern your own Lenten practice. What keeps your attention away from God? What do you *really* enjoy that you might give up for Lent? What connects you to God?

I invite you "to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word" (Book of Common Prayer, page 265).


Did You Know?

This year is the centennial of the installation and dedication of the Reredos. The Reredos is the group of carvings behind the High Altar. On October 5th, 1924, Bishop Page from Detroit was present for the dedication of these magnificent carvings which adorn the High Altar and immediately draw one's eyes to the front of the church. A reredos is a usually ornamental wood or stone screen or partition wall behind an Altar. The word goes back to the 14 th century.

Trinity Church Her People, Her Building Then and Now

The following is taken from the *Trinity Church Record*, an early bi-monthly newsletter that began in 1869. The information below is from Vol. III, Feb, and March, 1872. No 15.

Holy Days in February

The Purification This Feast is to commemorate the presenting of Christ in the Temple by His mother, when she went up to offer the customary sacrifice required of every woman who gave birth to a male child.

It corresponds to "The Churching of Women" in our Prayer Book -- when women may make some offering to Him for His goodness.

The Virgin Mary brought her turtledoves because [she was] too poor to bring a lamb. So should every woman bring her substance as God has blessed her, that with prayers and alms, she may appear before Him who has sanctified married life to the populating of the world, and the building up of His kingdom.

Ash Wednesday

This is the first day of Lent and is so called from the fact that it was formerly the custom for persons who were admitted as penitents to the church to sprinkle Ashes upon their heads this day, and wear sackcloth as a token of their humility, and sorrow for their sins. We should begin today to spiritually humble ourselves, that the season of Lent may prove a benefit to us.

St. Matthias Day

On this day is commemorated the death of the Apostle who was elected to fill the place of the traitor, Judas. As he was the first addition to that band of laborers who have descended in the same line to the present day, with him begins the Apostolic Succession so essential to the perpetuity of that Ministry which Christ instituted. (In 1969 the feast day was moved from February 24 to May 14 so as not to occur during Lent.)

On the evening of the 13th, a few friends of the Rev. John Wright, gathered around him to say farewell, and wish him God speed to a safe return. For one year at least he will be absent from his flock, gathering strength and wisdom in older and sunnier lands. His feet will press the sacred soil of our Saviour's birthplace, and his eyes will behold the scenes of His sufferings. He will view with eager gaze the rippling Jordan, the stately Nile and meandering Enon; his ears will listen to the whispering zephyr that linger round the cedars of Lebanon, and his thoughts will ponder over the futility of man's efforts to perpetuate his own greatness as he beholds the ruins of Damascus.

The prayers of his congregation and friends will follow him in his journeyings, and their hopes and fears will weave around him, the golden chains of fond remembrance.

Faithfully gleaned by the Historical Guild

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During Lent, people often fast or give up something special to them (perhaps a food indulgence), which is supposed to prepare their hearts and minds for Easter.

A similar time of fasting and prayer is seen in the Gospel of Matthew in the New Testament, when Satan tempted Jesus in the wilderness for 40 days. Each "temptation" was a test of Jesus's faith, an effort to get him to doubt that he was really the son of God or to renounce his devotion in exchange for wealth and glory. But instead of succumbing to temptation, Jesus answered Satan each time by quoting Scripture from the Old Testament. As the story goes, the Devil then left, and the angels surrounded Jesus as he began preparing for his ministry.

That's where the Lenten fast comes in. It hearkens back to these ideas of temptation and sacrifice, and its goal is to help Christians achieve a deeper understanding of their faith. Instead of a 40-day fast, however, Christians might engage in shorter fasts or abstain from things they particularly love, like soda, alcohol, desserts or social media. When they feel hungry or miss the thing they're abstaining from, they should acknowledge that and turn to prayer and the Bible.


