Pennings from your priest...

On Saturday, October 17, 2015 I was one of ten people who gathered at the diocesan office in Saginaw to talk about establishing a diocesan-wide anti-poverty network. Those in attendance not only had a wide array of experience and expertise in the anti-poverty and social justice arenas, we also share a passion for finding ways to eradicate poverty.

Several in attendance do direct work with the poor. Craig Leavitt is the Executive Director of Crossover Downtown Outreach Ministries. Crossover, located in downtown Flint, is a faith-based, non-denominational, nonprofit agency that helps families, children and the homeless with emergency needs.

Crossover was founded by three Flint churches – First Presbyterian, St. Paul’s Episcopal and Court Street United Methodist. Those three churches, along with Riverside Tabernacle since 2001, are among the many funding sources for Crossover.

Also in attendance was Danielle Brown, director of Christ Enrichment Center (CEC). Formerly Christ Episcopal Church in Flint, CEC has always had literacy as its focus. The agency serves families – even toddlers and women expecting children.

The staff at CEC, paid and volunteer, is committed to putting resources into children because they are the future. They are the ones, Danielle noted, who could put an end to generational poverty.

Joe Jenney, the priest at St. Andrew’s in Harrisville, spoke about a program he has put in place in his church and area. First, however, because Joe is a numbers guy he provided us with some shocking statistics.

Since 1980, the United States has put an additional 14 million people into poverty. Since 2007, the US economy has added 2.7 million jobs to the work force, of which only 230,000 are full-time.

Joe introduced his program with a question – one that he put to himself and was putting to each of us. “What can I do to lift people out of poverty or keep them out of poverty?” His is a program, Joe said, that addresses poverty one-on-one, which is the way he believes it needs to be addressed.

Joe’s program, Day 1, works with mothers of children between infancy and three years of age who are at risk of abuse or neglect. With the help of professionals, women are identified who have a desire to get out of poverty. Each one is assigned a mentor.

They are given information on nutrition by a registered nurse, and budgeting help by a David Ramsey-certified budgeter. The people who help the women are called Samaritans, and Church Insurance has agreed to cover them for liability.

Bobbie Walton, who is a member of St. Christopher's, Grand Blanc, spoke about the importance of advocacy. She related some of her experience building coalitions and testifying, both in Lansing and before her local board of commissioners.

Those of us who were present agreed that poverty is systemic, and that rules and barriers abound which keep people stuck in poverty. Our politicians and the media portray the poor as the enemy, when in reality the enemy is those who profit from "the institution of poverty."

We who gathered on October 17 will be meeting again on Sunday, November 22nd from 4:00 p.m. – 6:00 p.m. at the diocesan office to continue our discussion on how we might function most effectively as the diocesan Anti-poverty Network. We are looking for more people to join us around the table. If you are interested please let me know.

There is much work to be done. We need you. So, please think about becoming a part of the diocesan anti-poverty network.

In addition to the food basket items each family will receive a \$10 voucher from Jack's to purchase meat.



Here is the list of items for the Holiday Baskets: boxed stuffing (such as Stove Top), instant potatoes, canned yams, cranberry sauce, canned green beans, canned corn, brownie mix, and muffin mix. If you would prefer to give a monetary donation checks can be made out to the Trinity Food Pantry, and Jan will do the shopping.

Tuesday, November 10 is the last day we can accept items for the **Thanksgiving Baskets**. They will be distributed to the families on Monday, November 23 and Tuesday, November 24. Items for the **Christmas Baskets** need to be at the church by **Tuesday, December 15**. Those baskets will be distributed to families on Monday, December 21 and Tuesday, December 22.

Thanks to all of you for your ongoing generosity toward the most vulnerable of God's children.

The Pomegranate



Native to the Middle East and cultivated since ancient times in the Mediterranean area, the pomegranate is a fruit rich in symbolism and meaning in many cultures. Its jewel-like fruit was used as both food and medicine. With many seeds it was an emblem of fertility, and by association, love and marriage.

In pagan times it was a symbol of rebirth and the awakening of nature. The ancient Egyptians regarded it as a symbol of prosperity and ambition.

Pomegranates were also sacred to the ancient Israelites. They are among the fruit mentioned in the Promised Land. They were also embroidered in the hem of the garment of the High Priest, and decorated the tops of the pillars of Solomon's Temple. The fruit is said to contain 613 seeds, the number of laws in the Torah.

In Christian art, the pomegranate's red seeds depict the blood of Jesus. The seeds bursting forth are also likened to Christ bursting forth from the tomb.

Thus, the pomegranate is a symbol of Christ's suffering, death and resurrection. The seeds are also said to represent the people of the church, royalty and eternal life.

In November, as we remember the saints who have gone before us at All Saints' Day, and at harvest time as we are thankful for God's bounty, may we ponder the message of the pomegranate remembering Christ's promise of eternal life, and pray that we "wholesome grain and pure may be."

The vestry meets monthly to conduct the business of the parish. Meetings generally last less than two hours. If you would like more information on the workings of the vestry, feel free to contact any member of the nominating committee or Rev. Ann.

We are in great need of people to serve on the committees of the parish such as Finance, Stewardship, Personnel, Buildings and Grounds, to name a few. All committees include members of the vestry and members of the congregation.

We also need additional lay participants for Sunday morning. We need lectors (readers of the lessons), intercessors (leaders of the Prayers of the People), Eucharistic Ministers (those who administer the chalice at Holy Communion) and Eucharistic Visitors (those who take Holy Communion to shut-ins).




Thankful Hearts

Make table decorations that serve as Thanksgiving conversation-starters.

What you need:

- Paper and pencil
- Scissors
- Cloth or felt
- Needle and thread
- Sewing machine (optional)
- Fiber fill, cotton balls or rice
- Adult help




What you do:

1. Cut out a heart pattern (any size) on paper. Allow 1/4" for a seam if you'll be using a sewing machine.
2. Cut out material hearts, placing pieces right sides out if sewing by hand and right sides together if using a machine.
3. For hand-sewing, use a running stitch or an overcast stitch. Leave an opening for stuffing.
4. With a machine, sew along a 1/4" seam, allowing a 1" opening so you can turn the heart inside out and insert stuffing. Trim close to seam but don't cut stitching.
5. Fill with stuffing. Sew the opening shut by hand.
6. Put a heart at each place setting. Before dinner, have guests pick theirs up and say why they have a thankful heart.
