Dear Trinity Community,

"Jeremiah said that he had received a vision, an important vision, and the vision was this: the messiah was among the ranks of the monks. The Abbot was flabbergasted. One among his own was the Messiah! Who could it be? He knew it wasn't himself, but who? He raced back to the monastery and shared his exciting news with his fellow monks.

"The monks grew silent as they looked into each other's faces. Was this one the Messiah?

"From that day on the mood in the monastery changed. Joseph and Ivan started talking again, neither wanting to be guilty of slighting the Messiah. Pierre and Naibu left behind their frosty anger and sought out each other's forgiveness. The monks began serving each other, looking out for opportunities to assist, seeking healing and forgiveness where offence had been given.

"As one traveler, then another, found their way to the monastery word soon spread about the remarkable spirit of the place. People once again took the journey to the monastery and found themselves renewed and transformed. All because those monks knew the Messiah was among them."

At this time of bright colors, let us look into one another's eyes, see the face of Christ, and be changed.

**EPISCOPAL YOUTH EVENT** Did you know? (EYE 2023)

World Youth Event

This past summer, the 4th through the 8th of July at the University of Maryland, Episcopal youth came from all over the world for the Episcopal Youth Event. This is the first Episcopal Youth Event since the Covid

pandemic. Michigan was represented by over 20 youth and 7 adult chaperones from the Dioceses of Michigan, Eastern and Western Michigan. Youth gathered together to worship, attend workshops, play games and socialize, and even trade items from their respective Diocese. Did you know that Michigan won the Family Feud game? We traded stickers with other youth. We received a seashell lay from Hawaii, Crystals from Arkansas, Pin from Taiwan, Candy from Mexico, T-shirt from the ECCC (Episcopal Camps & Conference Centers) and many stickers from various Dioceses.

There were speakers, such as Presiding Bishop Michael Curry, and Julia Ayala Harris, President of the House of Deputies. Bishops from around the world came with youth from their Dioceses and spoke about their journey through faith. They related their stories to the book of Esther. Bishop Michael Curry quoted Esther 4:14, "telling us that you were born for a time such as this." Both were very moving in their speeches and had the ability to fire up the Episcopal youth. We met for two hours, twice a day to worship and sing together.

Did you know that Bishop Bonnie Perry from the Diocese of Michigan has some dance moves? Some of the workshops that were offered were preventing gun violence, with a survivor of the Oxford shooting, which I attended. I also attended "10 things to know before you turn 18" and a workshop on Government in the Episcopal Church and how it works. Also, encouraging youth to attend the General Convention in Louisville in 2024.

In closing, I am glad I was afforded the opportunity to be one of the many Michigan youth to go. I had the most amazing time at this event. I highly recommend, in three years, that if any youth are interested in going, Go! I was apprehensive about going so far away from home, but I am glad I went. # **Building Bridges: Identifying Common** Mission and Vision for our **Dioceses**

#### A series of reflections from recent bi-diocesan listening sessions

Earlier this year and over the last few years, the Building Bridges Team -- the group facilitating our discernment around our bidiocesan relationship -- offered a series of listening sessions with lay and clergy leaders reflecting on their ministries, our ministry together as a diocesan community, and our call to seek and serve God in all people in this peninsula.

For the last several weeks, our Building Bridges Steering Committee have shared what we heard from you through listening sessions we've hosted over the last three years, and especially the sessions offered in early 2023. In response to the themes that emerged, our Mission and Vision team developed new mission and vision statements to guide us through our Season of Practice and beyond, whether operating together through juncture, separately, or something in between.

The emerging mission and vision statements are:

Mission Statement: Called by Christ to proclaim and embody God's boundless love for all creation, we grow:

- Collaborative communities of faith, walking the journey together;
- Innovative ministries, stretching beyond our walls;
- Courageous disciples, striving to transform systems of injustice.

We nurture relentless hope for a world longing for mercy, restoration, and peace.

Vision Statement: A world transformed, in which all God's children are unconditionally welcomed, cared for, and loved.

We look forward to sharing more about what we've learned, what we have yet to learn, and where we think the Spirit is calling us at our bidiocesan convention in October!




# CHIMES



#### **SECURITY DURING WORSHIP**


We will be securing our building differently during worship.

Trinity Church Her People, Her Building Then and Now

Gleanings on the Sacrament of Baptism

The following is taken from the 1882 Vol. VIII, No. 5 *Trinity Church Bell*, an early newsletter of Trinity Church.

Reasons for the Sufficiency of Baptism by Pouring

1<sup>st</sup> Because it cannot be proved in a single instance from Holy Scripture that baptism was ever administered by plunging the whole body under water.

2<sup>nd</sup> Because the word baptizo (baptize) which occurs seventy-six times in the New Testament cannot be proved in a single instance to mean "plunge under."

3rd Because the word baptize is explained by the Holy Ghost himself to mean "pour out." St. John the Baptist foretold of Christ "He shall baptize you with the Holy Ghost" (St. Matt iii. 11) and when on the day of Pentecost, this prophecy is first fulfilled to the Jews, St. Peter declares concerning the event that "this is that which was spoken by the prophet Joel, I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh" (Acts ii. 16); so when the Gentiles first receive the baptism "with the Holy Ghost" it is again described as a pouring out — "on the Gentiles also was poured out the gift of the Holy Ghost (Acts x. 45)

4<sup>th</sup> Because the sacraments are means or instruments and not mere figures. They depend therefore for their efficacy, not on exactness of likeness or on quantity, but on God's power and promise in the use of the means appointed. A basin serves as well as a river; one crumb of bread, one drop of wine, is as efficacious as a hundred loaves or a whole vintage. "He that is washed needeth not save to wash his feet, but is clean every whit" (St. John xiii. 10) – this is the saying of our Lord that is applicable to

all sacramental acts. Were this not the case, the Holy Communion ought to be made a meal for supplying the body, for in proportion as it did so it would be an exact figure of satisfying the soul.

5<sup>th</sup> Because it is only within the last three centuries [four at this writing] that a religious society has sprung up which has insisted on immersion as the only valid method of baptism, while the historic Church of Christ in every age has practiced and allowed both those methods prescribed in the Book of Common Prayer, namely immersion and pouring. Trinity's Baptismal Font is octagonal, that is it has eight sides, reminding us of the eight people spared in the Flood: Noah and his wife, and their three sons and three daughters-in-law. Eight is also a number of rebirth or regeneration. Sometimes Sunday is considered the eighth day. The font was used in the original church on Washington Avenue and dates from 1870. A gift from the Sunday School Scholars, funds were secured from their penny offerings.
